STORAGE FACILITY CONSTRUCTION COMPLETE

STATE DENIES GRANT FUNDING



Construction on the shared salt storage facility is finally complete. The structure is massive in size! Additional site work around the property is still in progress, but generally speaking the structure is ready for use.

As first mentioned in the *May 2011* issue of the *Hilton Village News*, in 2012 the Town, Village, School District and Fire District went ahead with the plan to apply for a grant through the **Local Government Efficiency Grant Program** to fund the construction of the shared salt storage facility. Much to our disappointment and dismay, the grant was denied and funding was rejected for this project.

In a recent letter to Governor Andrew Cuomo, officials from the Town, Village, School and Fire District stated their combined disappointment with the lack of assistance from the State and made the case to reassess the project and reconsider the possibility of any available future financial assistance the State of New York could possibly provide. By outlining how shared services has saved taxpayers nearly \$317,000, we hope to persuade the Governor to re-evaluate the decision and grant our proposal. ■

Village Board members would like to give special recognition to Chris Tobin, *President of Monroe Tech*; a computer sales, service, repair and training shop, located at 53 South Avenue in Hilton. Chris has gone out of his way numerous times to benefit others in the community without any personal gain.



Chris set up free wi-fi service for the Hilton Community Center, supplying the modems and equipment at no cost. The service is available to anyone who uses the building.

Recently, Chris partnered with the Village of Hilton to offer Hilton's first, free electronic recycling collection event. I have also noted another

People cannot properly use the sidewalks as intended when they are blocked. The disabled, elderly, children and adults all need a safe place to walk. Please be sensitive and considerate of the needs of others when parking your car.

My personal thanks goes to the wonderful staff we have working for our village. From the DPW, to Code Enforcement to our Office Staff - all our employees have worked hard during the past few months making transitions in their job duties and positions. DUMPING ON VACANT PROPERTY IS ILLEGAL

Several complaints have been received by the Code Enforcement office regarding dumping of debris on vacant lots within the village. In an effort to increase awareness in the community, the Code Enforcement office would like to inform residents that dumping debris of any kind, including yard waste, branches, cut grass, leaves, dirt, etc. on vacant lots is always **ILLEGAL**.

It has been noted that many of the vacant lots around the village are overgrown and not properly maintained. The Code Enforcement office has been in contact with property owners and will continue to pursue that these lots be maintained on a regular basis. It is never acceptable for vacant property to be used as a dump site. When lot owners do come to maintain their property, often they have had to remove discarded debris before maintenance can be performed.

The Village offers several convenient services at no additional charge to provide a means of waste elimination. Yard waste collection is provided four times each year on the last Friday of April, May, June and September. Brush collection is offered all year long, alternating pick-up days on the 1st and 3rd Friday, north of the village and 2nd and 4th Friday, south of the village. Leaf collection begins in early October and continues through the first week in December. A dumpster is also available to haul concrete, dirt and stone for a \$10 fee. For more information or to reserve a dumpster, contact the Village Office at 392-4144.

If you are a witness to illegal dumping, please contact the Monroe County Sheriff's office at 911 and take note of any vehicle information, or if you know the identity, the address of those involved.

VILLAGE & TOWN AWARDED 3RD RECORDS MANAGEMENT IMPROVEMENT GRANT

The Village of Hilton and the Town of Parma were awarded a joint records grant from the New York State Local Government Records Management Improvement Fund. This is the third in a series of grants that the Village and Town applied for and were successfully awarded. \$131,099 will be divided between the municipalities and will support the transferring of all master files, building records, large maps and other important documents from paper to electronic. All documents will

have to be sorted, scanned to laserfich and then waferfiched - a process of storing data that provides protection and preservation along with easy access. This new "green" technology helps to prevent the need for boxes of documents, papers and films and large storage areas.

The grant money will provide for an outside company to be hired to perform the time-consuming laserfich (imaging) and waferfich (storage) procedures.



NATIONAL SAFE PLACE FOR YOUTH IN CRISIS

The Village of Hilton Community Center, located at 59 Henry Street, is designated as a **SafePlace**. **SafePlace** is a national initiative that trains businesses to provide immediate assistance for youth in crisis and provides them with a safe area where they can feel secure. **SafePlace** is a free, confidential and voluntary program.



Young people between the ages of 12 and 21 in crisis can enter the **SafePlace** location in their area and receive the help they need. **SafePlace** sites are located throughout the Rochester area and in Monroe County, as well as across the United States. Designated **SafePlace** sites are marked with a yellow and black diamond shaped sign. No child will ever be turned away. Services are voluntary and the child makes the decision when to leave. Employees of the Hilton Community Center have been trained with **SafePlace** guidelines, to assist as needed. For after-hours emergency access, the Center for Youth can be reached at 271-7670.

FOODLINK MOBILE PANTRY
COMING TO HILTON IN NOVEMBER

Foodlink is a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide hunger relief. As part of that mission they sponsor a mobile food pantry for people in need.

A mobile pantry is a market on wheels, filled with essential nutritious food items, that travels to locations to serve people by supplying them with food.

The mobile pantry will set up a drive-through distribution site at the **Hilton Department of Public Works**, located at 50 Henry Street, on **November 23, 2013** from 11am until 1pm. Patrons will be able to drive up and remain in their car while their vehicle is loaded with 30 pounds of food, then leave. There is no charge for this service. Any family can come to the event. Make Your Home Fit For An H2O Hero!

“Creating green infrastructure for your home”

Green infrastructure is an approach to managing stormwater that protects water quality by soaking water into the ground rather than creating runoff.

Rain gardens and rain barrels are popular examples of green infrastructure that can easily be installed by homeowners.

Stormwater is rain water or snow melt that runs off of driveways, roofs, roads and parking lots rather than soaking into the ground. As stormwater flows across these hard surfaces, it collects automotive fluids, fertilizers, pesticides, pet waste, and sediments.

These pollutants are conveyed, untreated, to the nearest waterway through the network of gutters, ditches, and pipes referred to as the stormwater system.

Rain Gardens

A rain garden is a planted, shallow depression that is designed to receive runoff from your roof or driveway and let it soak into the ground. Rain gardens are not ponds and are generally dry unless there has been a recent rain. Proper design and placement of a rain garden is important to insure that the runoff can easily be conveyed to the garden and will be quickly absorbed. Compost is generally added to the garden to increase the rate at which water soaks in the ground. a rain garden should be placed at least 10' from the house to avoid any impacts to the foundation.

Native plants that are attractive and adapted to highly variable amounts of water are a popular choice for rain gardens. Once established, a rain garden is very easy to maintain requiring only occasional weeding comparable to any other landscape feature. Rain Barrels

Rain barrels are designed to collect and store the runoff from your roof for later use in your garden or landscaping. Rain barrels and cisterns have been around for centuries and are becoming increasingly popular as an easy, low cost method of reducing stormwater runoff and protecting water quality.

A properly designed rain barrel includes an adequately sized overflow directed to an area which can safely receive this runoff. Find out how much rainwater comes off your roof at www.H2OHero.org. Downspout Disconnects

In some neighborhoods, roof downspouts are connected to the stormwater system at the street. The purpose of this design was to prevent standing water issues. Unfortunately, this arrangement can contribute to flooding downstream and

impact water quality.

Disconnecting the downspouts from your roof, and directing the water to a rain barrel, rain garden, or suitable lawn area, will reduce the amount of water that enters the stormwater system. However, before you disconnect any downspouts, it's important to give proper consideration to local building codes and how the runoff will be managed so that it does not result in standing water or impact your home or adjacent properties. Runoff should be conveyed at least 10' from the foundation to a flat location with enough space to properly soak it into the ground.


